# BHS STUDENTS PARTICIPATE, WIN IN ENTREPRENEURIAL YOUTH SUMMIT

Thirteen Brockport High School students traveled to Bryant & Stratton College to participate in the 2022 Junior Achievement Entrepreneurial Youth Summit.

Modeled after the hit TV show Shark Tank, the summit has been hosted in Rochester for over 50 years and, in November, BHS students joined approximately 100 other students from eight different schools across Monroe County to develop the skills they need to successfully give a proper business pitch, work as a team, and gain confidence in public speaking.

The field trip was part of an Entrepreneurism class with Mr. Mark Mutton. Having heard about this opportunity, the summit was quickly identified as an important learning experience for our students in a real-world setting.

"Having an understanding of the world of business and how economics works in business is important," Mutton said.



"Entrepreneurism is having the personality and passion of creating your own business or idea and growing it. Economics can certainly affect your business, but an entrepreneur's leadership abilities will define whether that person will succeed or fail in that venture, regardless of the state of the economy."

During the summit, students split into 17 teams and were joined by one of the 18

mentors who worked to help the groups craft their pitch for one of four judges, all of whom are successful entrepreneurs from the Greater Rochester Area. The judges went on to critique the groups based upon their creativity and overall idea, their communication skills, and their group's participation.

Though this is the first year Brockport has participated in the summit, three of the four teams that were selected to advance to the finals included a representative from Brockport—where they pitched their idea to their peers. Two BHS students, Ethan Ruggles and Greg Rightmyer were part of the winning team, receiving a Rocketbook for their pitch called "Design Lab," a 3D body scanning application for clothing stores to help consumers have a better fitting experience.

For attending the summit, the students will be eligible to apply for two scholarships, including a four-year full-ride scholarship from Syracuse University.



Being able to offer a mixture of classroom education and actual hands-on opportunities are critical for BHS students to better understand what opportunities are available to them beyond high school.

outstanding events, accomplishments and activities that are occurring on our campus.



## Brockport administrators help prepare next generation of educators

Barclay Elementary Principal Scott Morrison and Fred Hill Elementary Assistant Principal Lauren Combo helped student teachers at SUNY Brockport complete mock-interviews in preparation for graduation. In December, Mr. Morrison and Miss Combo posed as interviewers to help soon-to-be college graduates in the Childhood Inclusive Education program prepare to secure teaching jobs after graduation.

Since 2016, Brockport Central Schools' faculty has helped to prepare future educators by participating in the mock interview simulation. Both Mr. Morrison and Miss Combo have served on the mock-interview committee in previous years. This year, they met a group of students at the college and provided tips and tricks on how to have a successful interview.

"It's helpful to understand where some of our potential teacher candidates are coming from and what we can expect from the next generation of teachers," Combo said. "It allows us to better prepare the District's resources so we can meet the candidates where they are, in order to ensure our new teachers have a successful first year."

"This process is a good way to give back to the teaching profession," Morrison said. "It also provides candidates, who are coming through, with a great opportunity to gain some in-person interviewing experience, ask questions, and receive feedback. It's something I never had when I was in their shoes."

While the administrators helped students at the collegiate level, their BCSD students were never far from their minds.

"We know students in our district are searching for their first jobs or are preparing to go on interviews themselves," Combo said. "It's important to remember to be on time, to dress for the position you're applying for, and to smile – let your personality shine."

This program is possible through the District's strong connection with the college.

"If they [the students] haven't had an opportunity to work with the District yet, it's a great way for them to see District representatives and work with us a little," Morrison said. "It's a great connection we have with the college, and it begins with that networking."

Fifty students from Brockport High School were inducted into the District's chapter of National Honor Society (NHS). # OMS focusing on professional development opportunities

Teachers at Oliver Middle School have had many professional development opportunities this year, primarily focusing on increasing access to instruction. To increase access, teachers have been provided training on the following elements:

- Instructional Match Ensuring lesson content is appropriately matched to students' abilities.
- Content Review at Lesson Start Making sure the lesson opens with a brief review of concepts or material that have previously been presented.
- Preview of Lesson Goals(s) Discussing why the goals/ learning targets should be shared at the start of instruction.
- Chunking of New Material Emphasizing why teachers should break new material into small, manageable increments, 'chunks', or steps
- Creating an Environment Where Students Can Thrive
- Strategies for English Language Learners

Professional development on these topics has included presentations from experts from outside the District.

Our Subject Area Leaders and Teacher Leaders are also participating in a book study and lead activities/discussions to highlight techniques that can be used to solve academic and behavior problems.

#### **Driver Education**

Enrolled students will receive instruction in the classroom, behind the wheel, and on the road, as required by New York State Department of Motor Vehicles. Those successfully completing the class will receive an MV285 certificate that gives the holder the privilege to receive a Class D operator's license when reaching age 17, allowing them to drive after 9 p.m. Students must be 16 years old and hold a valid NYS Driver Permit or License to be eligible for the course. The Pre-Licensing 5-Hour Course material is included in Driver Education. The loan of a text is included in the class fee.

Most insurance companies will offer a discount on compulsory car insurance upon request.

**Classroom instruction:** ALL students must attend ALL classroom instruction in the Brockport High School Room 192.

Please note: Student must be present for the first theory class to be allowed entry into the course. Please arrive 15 minutes prior to the start of the first class. (Late arrivals will not be admitted and, if registered, will forfeit course enrollment). No early dismissals from theory class allowed.

# Students must have the following for theory class:

- Permit/license
- NYS Driver Manual
- Notebook/folder
- Writing materials

Students must be prepared with the following for each car class:

- Permit/license
- Sunglasses are encouraged
- Appropriate footwear (i.e. no backless sandals)

**Driving groups** will start at the High School westside (student) parking lot for the 3:15 p.m. groups and end at the eastside (poolside) parking lot. The 4:45 p.m. groups will start and end at the eastside (poolside) parking lot. Driving classes may be rescheduled at the instructor's discretion due to inclement weather. Should a make-up driving class be requested by a student due to extenuating circumstances, the instructor will reschedule at their discretion. Driving groups may be rescheduled to place four drivers in each time block. Every effort will be made to accommodate rescheduling conflicts. However, the instructor reserves the right to create a schedule that is most effective in terms of number of students scheduled for each driving group. Scheduling of or transportation to the road test are not included. Parents or other qualified adults should plan to devote time for enrolled students to practice the skills learned in this class. Only experience and good judgment makes a safe driver. A current NYS Learner's Permit must be brought to all

## **Safe Driving Techniques (Five-Hour Course)**

The NYS Bureau of Motor Vehicles requires five hours of classroom instruction as a prerequisite for obtaining a driver's license. Applicants affected by this regulation are those applying for a first-time driver's license; those applying for a driver's license because of a lapse of a one-year renewal grace period; and those applying for a new license as a result of revocation of a previous license. The five-hour training period must be completed prior to the applicant applying for a road test. Persons having completed a regular driving education course do NOT need this program.

The following regulations are applicable to all prospective registrants:

• Registration must be completed by mailing the registration form or in person at Oliver Middle School by noon the Tuesday immediately preceding the class. There is a seven-person minimum to hold this class. Registering on time reduces the risk of cancellation.

- Students will be admitted on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Applicants must be 16 years of age or older.
- Applicants must bring their valid learner's permit to register.
- Applicants must pay the \$40 registration fee upon registering and completely fill out the registration form.

An official completion certificate, which is valid for one year from the day of issuance, will be given upon completion of the five-hour program. This certificate must be presented when applying for a road test. It does not qualify participants for reduced insurance rates.

# **BHS Drama Club** performs Clue

The BHS Drama Club will be performing Clue as the spring play in April!

Based on the iconic 1985 Paramount movie which was inspired by the classic Hasbro board game, Clue is a hilarious farce-meets-murder mystery. The tale begins at a remote mansion, where six mysterious guests assemble for an unusual dinner party where murder and blackmail are on the menu. When their host turns up dead, they all become suspects.
