Career Internship Program leaves lasting impression on seniors

More than two dozen dedicated seniors spent countless hours this year immersed in hands-on career exploration through participation in the Career Internship Program at Brockport High School.

The Career Internship Program provides students the opportunity to gain experience in career fields of their choice, while developing professionalism, communication and other skills that will travel with them throughout their future career paths.

Students this year worked in a variety of fields, including real estate, education, law enforcement, nursing, physical therapy, veterinary technician, music therapy and more. Once assigned to a location, each student was paired with a mentor. This year's mentor of the year award was given to Tina Visconte, branch manager of the Chili-Ogden Office of Howard Hanna Real Estate Services. Visconte mentored three BHS students this year, who she described as eager to learn, enthusiastic

about the business and thankful for the insight and experience.

"It was so fulfilling to be a mentor to the three BHS students with an interest in the real estate industry. Our clients were always excited to have them shadow us on appointments and showings," said Visconte. "What a fantastic hands-on opportunity for them to decide if a specific career is the right fit before they invest time and energy into pursuing a degree in a certain field."

Students raved about their experiences as well. Many of the 28 seniors in the program clocked more than 100 hours at their internships, sometimes going even when not required by the class. They all said they are grateful for what the program has provided.

"Not only did I learn so much about the career that I am interested in, but I learned so much about myself in terms of my levels of comfort with certain things,"said Regan Eldridge,



physician assistant intern at Unity at Ridgeway and Highland Hospital. "Going into college I know that I already have a leg up in the protocols of the medical field as well as general terminology."

Seniors celebrated the culmination of the 2018 Career Internship Program at Brockport High School on June 4 with a reception and display boards showcasing their experiences.

Hill students light the way

A group of Hill students sent the gift of light to peers across the globe as part of a project dedicated to ending the cycle of energy poverty for marginalized communities around the world. The students assembled solar lights for students in Papua New Guinea. Many students and families in Papua New Guinea face respiratory health risks posed by the use of inexpensive kerosene lights in homes without electricity.

The project was orchestrated through SolarBuddy, a charity founded by Simon Doble in Brisbane, Australia. Their mission is to provide safe, reliable, effective and innovative solar energy solutions to communities who suffer from the limiting effects of energy poverty. Up until now SolarBuddy has partnered with Australian schools to help Australian students develop a deeper understanding of energy poverty.

The Hill School was the first American school to participate in the project, thanks to coordination provided by fourth-grade teacher Melissa Norment. Norment learned about the project through an evening news spot on ABC (Australian Broadcasting Corporation)

when she was visiting family in Australia. The next day she emailed the founder, Simon Doble, and her principal, Brandon Broughton. Through the enthusiasm of these three people, the SolarBuddy Project became a reality.

The system has proven effective and efficient and we appreciate your willingness to acclimate to the new process. We have since upgraded the system so that once visitors show their ID at one building, the information will be disseminated to all school buildings. If you have already been entered into the system this year, your information will remain on record for the upcoming year. As a reminder, the system requires every visitor to show a valid, government-issued ID when entering any school on campus during school hours.

The launch of our district mobile application is another significant stride in our commitment to open communication. We are excited that the app is up and running and look forward to expanding its use in the upcoming school year. More than 500 people have already downloaded

the app. To download the app, visit the play store on your mobile device and search "Brockport Central."

The attached awards supplement features a mere sampling of the extraordinary feats of our student body. Beyond academics, our students excel both inside and outside the walls of the classroom. Some are gifted athletically, others possess incredible musical talent, some thrive with community service while others shine in the arts or trades. New summer book mobile to roll into action

The Summer Book Mobile will return new and improved for its second year, thanks to an extraordinary collaboration between staff, students and the community. The Summer Book Mobile is a library on wheels that travels to designated locations and allows students to check books in and out throughout the summer. The initiative was spearheaded by Brockport CSD librarians as an effort to prevent the "summer slide" that tends to occur if students fail to read over the summer.

The book mobile debuted last summer in the district's food service van, which the librarians temporarily revamped to fit the need. This year students in Craig Coon's Engineering Design and Development redesigned an old school bus to accommodate bookshelves. It took months of planning, designing, trial and error, determination and execution, but the students completed the

project in time for the book mobile's summer travels.

Technology students were not the only students involved; several high school clubs played roles as well. New this year are STEM kits, compiled by Astronomy Club, Horticulture students and National Honor Society members.

The book mobile is also expanding its hours and locations this year, due to feedback from last year's attendees.

Other organizations that supported the book mobile through funding, time or donations include the PTSA, Brockport Teachers Association, BCSD Transportation Department, Brockport Food Shelf, Presbyterian Church, Wegmans and Walmart.

Expanding the 1:1 initiative to all five schools

In September 2018 when the doors of each of Brockport CSD's five schools open, every student will have a digital device to use as needed throughout the school day. Students in grades 6-12 will have the opportunity to take their devices home. More information will be forthcoming regarding this plan.

Brockport is embracing the need for embedding technology as a tool in education to engage, enhance and extend student learning. Providing access to the tools is the first step for students to learn and apply the skills to build knowledge, create new learning, communicate globally

and behave ethically and responsibly in an interconnected digital world. However, ensuring the technology is used thoughtfully and purposefully is our first priority. Students will not be using the technology all day every day. We encourage thoughtful use of screen time at home as well.

During professional development teachers focus on clear instructional strategies to meet learning targets and emphasize quality over quantity. Curriculum is written to carefully align the ISTE (International Standards for Technology in Education) and core content standards to allow for an authentic intersection of learning:

Hill library transformed into elaborate land of literacy

The Hill School library was transformed into a world of elaborate literacy stations at the third annual Hill School Literacy Fair.

The Literacy Fair provided students the opportunity to experience reading and writing in engaging and unique mini "worlds," ranging from Cave of Characters to Deep Sea Sentences to Poe-Tree Forest and more. Students were challenged to showcase their skills through ten different hands-on opportunities.

Fourth-grade teacher Justin Jackson spearheaded the Literacy Fair with assistance from other teachers and staff at Hill. He said the fair was an immense success, especially the family night on May 10.

"Our Family Night allowed parents and siblings to engage in literacy experiences together, whether it be sharing a read aloud while enjoying ice cream or competing in a giant Scrabble game," said Jackson. "By having Hill School faculty and staff, community members and high school students facilitate each station, we showed kids that students, teachers, parents and more can all enjoy reading and writing together."

The Literacy Fair ran from May 7 to 10.

First-graders practice computer programming

First-graders at Ginther explored the basics of computer programming during lessons in the media center this May. First they participated in "Coding Unplugged" activities where they moved around the room in various sequences and learned "If... Then..." language. Then iPads were integrated into the



equation. Students learned how to use basic coding to program sequences in an app called Tynker that allowed their characters to move forward, avoid obstacles and collect important objects.

Students loved applying the skills they learned to their iPads and excelled at the challenges. Further, teachers said that integrating technology into the classroom beginning at a young age empowers our students and enhances learning.

Librarian Jennifer Nather and Instructional Coach Kelly Keenan, both members of the district's Digital Readiness Team, worked together to

plan and implement the lessons (with some technical help from the CEPACS department and Ginther's microcomputer technician).

"We keep hearing about the importance of preparing our students for jobs that may not even exist right now," said Nather and Keenan. "Watching 6- and 7- year-olds on this program makes us both impressed with how intuitive these students are. They were moving to levels on the program we didn't imagine they would."

Both hope to grow the excitement by beginning these lessons during Computer Science Week in early December next year.

OMS chorus partners with Houghton College

Seventh- and eighth-grade chorus members premiered new music during their spring concert on May 30, courtesy of a partnership with Houghton College.

Eric Bernardin and Jeffrey Hansen, music students at Houghton College's Greatbatch School of Music, composed two songs that were winners of an ongoing commission project with the college. The purpose of the project was to enable our students to premier new music while giving young composers the chance to work with a real middle level choral ensemble. The music needed to sound advanced, while being performable by middle school students.

The college students visited OMS on May 10 to work with the chorus in advance of the spring concert. Our middle schoolers were excited to meet their composers and honored to be part of the project.

Friendship benches at Ginther



A year I will never forget

I have had thousands of incredible moments, emails, letters and reflections this year. There are some standouts. I tried to journal out the year; I failed two weeks in. Journaling is not my style. Nearly all of my experiences were wonderful, although a few funny awkward ones stand out. Here they are in snippets, my life as the 2018 New York State Teacher of the Year:

The week after I found out the news, over ten former NYS teachers of the year reached out to me. They have been my lifelines this year and have become important friends. There is very little support for the New York Teacher of the Year program at the state level. However, the state teachers of the year is a tight bunch. They are all a phone call away. They provided incredible clarity. It will become my job to mentor in the 2019 New York State Teacher of the Year.

I privately set up a meeting with NYS Commissioner of Education, Mary Ellen Elia (summer 2017) before I was announced as the teacher of the year. We sat and talked for over an hour in her private quarters, mostly getting to know each other. I realized that we will be working closely together and I thought it was important to get

to know each other. Getting to know her first has made for a wonderful working relationship. I tried to make this a practice all year. I think that it is important that people know each other. The

investment in building these bridges allow us to be more productive.

In August, before the formal announcement, I traveled to Albany and met El-Wise Noisette. He is the official NYSUT photographer. He is one of the nicest people I met all year. When I was presented with the teacher of the year honor in September, he asked my son, Aaron, to stay with him. They took pictures together all day. It gave my son a close up view of everything and it meant the world to me.

As Mr. Noisette was taking Aaron around for camera angles, I looked at my wife. The teacher of the year award in New York is presented in the Board of Regents Chamber in front of the Chancellor, the Commissioner and the Board of Regents. I was expected to give a 10 minute speech, too. My 83-year-old dad was asleep at the Board of Regents meeting moments before I was named the New York State Teacher of the Year. My wife "gave him the elbow" so he did not miss the big moment. Amy Stoker and I have taught together for 20 years. Having her there with me meant the world to me. Dr. Myers, Mr. Broughton and Amy's husband, Andy, came too. It was awesome.

When I returned to Brockport from Albany, my classroom door was totally decorated with balloons and notes from so many teachers and students. Nothing beats feeling loved. Mrs. Carges and Mrs. Bourg had put a mountain of congratulation cards on my desk and my special education partner, Mrs. Salisbury, put balloons

everywhere. At 10 p.m., I sat and read every card.

Calling Ben Olson, BHS graduate and USA Sergeant in the Marines, to tell him about being named teacher of the year was extraordinarily meaningful. He wrote one of the letters of recommendation. He used to be my student, now he is my good friend. Ben was deployed

shortly after I found out in June of 2017 that I was going to be named teacher of the year. Though this award was a celebration, I spent the first six months of it thinking about Ben nearly every

day waiting for the call that he was back in the United States. When I was named, Ben made me promise to read the book "Meditations" by Marcus Arillius. I annotated an 1873 version of this book and gave it to Ben when he



returned from his second tour in the Middle East. Jimmy Z surprised my class with celebration ice cream the day after I was officially the teacher of the year. It confirmed once again why I love the community of Brockport.

A week later, it meant the world to me that people came to hear me speak at the Brockport Board of Education meeting. Four people/groups stand out... a lot of my students were there. My former student, TJ Sharpe, presented a proclamation to me from Mr. Ort. Getting an award from a student is a really neat feeling. Mr. Ron Ayrault (Korean War Veteran) was there. He has come to my room on Veteran's Day every year that I have taught in Brockport. My fifthgrade teacher and hero, Jim Karg, was there sitting next to my wife. The Board of Education presented me with the Democrat and Chronicle article on a plaque.

This school year I visited over 50 schools all over New York and Pennsylvania. This was my decision. When I am on the road for a speaking engagement, most events are in the evening. Mornings are open. I decided to take all of the prize money (about a thousand dollars) and began buying books to give out with lessons. I gave out thousands of books. When people saw what I was doing, money literally poured in. Margie Pinto-Leite of Connecticut (the daughter of the world famous author Barbara Robinson) sent me her entire classroom of books. This was the best part of being teacher of the year. Generosity breeds generosity. I set up all visits on my own. These visits allowed me to see the incredible diversity of schools all over our state. There is a lot to be proud of. In particular, I will always recall a real chicken farm at one school, another school that operates an apple orchard, a school that teaches Mandarin as a foreign language at kindergarten, one school that supplements its energy with a wind turbine, one school that has decided to combat violence by not putting locks on doors and focus on building relationships with the community, and one school where I walked through a metal detector with a second grader.

On Jan. 1, 2019, I will pass the torch to another teacher. They will need mentoring, a listening ear and gentle suggestions. I look forward to giving this gift as it was given to me. I will always carry the title of the New York State Teacher of the Year, but I will admit, this year has been special.

What I discovered this year confirms what I already knew. I love living and working in my own community. I look forward to continuing to be a trustee of the Western Monroe Historical Society and the Clarkson Historical Society. I want to continue to build confidence in people through running, especially

through Team Jomar. I look forward to producing the yearbook with kids and running the spelling bee. The bottom line is that I was happy before this award, and though there will be some added responsibility, I consider being a fourth-grade teacher in Brockport the greatest achievement of my career. Plaques are fun to look at, but seeing students grow up is still my passion. I truly love teaching fourth grade right here in Brockport. I loved it for the 22 years before this honor, and after this year, I plan on living the life of a teacher. I love what I do, and I love the town where I live and teach.

Driving Courses

Safe Driving Techniques (five-hour course)

Effective Oct. 1, 1987, the Bureau of Motor Vehicles of the State of New York requires five hours of classroom instruction as a prerequisite for obtaining a driver's license. Applicants affected by this regulation are those applying for a first time driver's license; those applying for a driver's license because of lapse of one-year renewal grace period; and those applying for a new driver's license as a result of revocation of previous license. The five-hour training period must be completed prior to the applicant applying for a road test. Persons having completed a regular driving education course do not need this program.

The following regulations are applicable to all prospective registrants:

- Registration must be completed at the high school in person by noon on the Tuesday immediately preceding the class. There is a seven-person minimum to hold this class, so registering on time will reduce the risk of cancellation.
- Students will be admitted on a first come first serve basis.
- Applicants must be 16 years of age or older.
- Applicants must bring their valid learner's permit to register.
- Applicants must pay the \$40 registration fee upon registering and completely fill out the registration form.

An official completion certificate, which is valid for one year from the day of issuance, will be awarded upon completion of the fivehour program. This certificate must be presented when applying for a road test. It does not qualify participants for reduced insurance rates.

Enrolled students will receive instruction in the classroom, behind the wheel and on the road as required by New York State Department of Motor Vehicles. Those successfully completing the class will receive an MV285 certificate that gives the holder the privilege to receive a Class D operator's license when reaching age 17, allowing them to drive after 9 p.m. Students must be 16 years old and hold a valid NYS driver permit or license to be eligible for the course. The Pre-Licensing Five-Hour Course material is included in Driver Education. The loan of a text is included in the class fee.

Most insurance companies will offer a discount on compulsory car insurance upon request.

Classroom instruction - ALL students must attend ALL classroom instruction in Brockport High School Room 192 as scheduled from 3:15 – 4:45 p.m.

Please note: Student must be present for the first theory class to be allowed entry into the course. Please arrive 15 minutes prior to the start of the first

class. (Late arrivals will not be admitted and, if registered, will forfeit course enrollment). No early dismissals from theory class allowed.

Only experience and good judgment make a safe driver. A current NYS Learner's Permit must be brought to all classes.

The cost is \$450 for residents, \$470 for non-residents. The registration deadline for Session I is Aug. 24, 2018 and the registration deadline for Session II is Oct. 25, 2018. Every effort will be made to accommodate your request. You will be notified by e-mail or telephone and a list will be posted in the high school if you have been accepted and enrolled. Not only did the event empower seniors to leave the district full of pride and confidence, but it also inspired our younger learners to excel in their academic journeys towards graduation.

The morning of June 23 was filled with a wide spectrum of emotions as the graduating Class of 2018 assembled at The College at Brockport Special Events Recreation Center for the 91st Brockport High School Commencement ceremony.

Joy, anticipation and pride were unmistakable as the senior class made their entrance into the room, felt by students, families and staff alike. Sounds of Pomp and Circumstance, played admiringly by the underclassmen in the Brockport High School Band, filled the arena. Senior choir members led the audience in the national anthem before the ceremonial speeches began.

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Lesli C. Myers welcomed everyone in attendance and BHS Principal Dr. Brian Weller introduced the board, administration, keynote speaker and class advisors.

Class of 2018 Salutatorian Daniel Foley kicked off the speech segment of the graduation ceremony. Foley shared a lesson that he said has driven him from a young age: anything worth doing is worth doing right. He stressed the importance of the need to look back on the past to be able to look forward. He also reflected on the skills learned in high school that lead to success throughout life: perseverance, thinking critically, time management and the need to overcome disagreements with those who think differently. While passion provides drive, he said rationality allows a realistic and sustainable approach to accomplishing those goals. The keynote address was presented by Michael Thomas, English teacher at BHS. Thomas began with quotes from Socrates, Plato and Hesiod that focused on the perception of youth as frivolous and disrespectful. He then shared significant milestones that began nearly 100 years

ago when his grandmother was born. Ultimately, those innovative advances were the result of new generations of knowledge. He concluded his thoughts by empowering students and letting them know that the future belongs to them.

Finally, each student's name and post-graduation plans were announced as they proudly walked across the stage to receive their diplomas. 
Pride emanated through each gleaming smile, sparkling eye and purposeful step as the Class of 2018 departed the SERC, ready to take on the world.


