# **Teaching the Next Generation of Teachers**

Students at Brockport High School are already thinking about what lies beyond graduation, and some students have had a new, unique opportunity to explore the profession of teaching this year.

Dually enrolled in both BHS and Monroe Community College, thirteen students are taking "Exploring the Teaching Profession" (EDU 100: Introduction to the Teaching Profession) with BHS teacher Tricia Arnold, getting hands-on experience in the world of teaching before they graduate.

"I have wanted to do something like this for a long time," Mrs. Arnold said. "Last year, Mr. Pincelli sent out a list of MCC Dual Enrollment courses and I saw that there were a few education courses on there. I thought it was the perfect opportunity."

With interests spanning all grade levels and subject areas, students enrolled in the program have each been able to visit four different classrooms to gain an idea of what teaching might look like at different levels and within different buildings or subject areas.

"I have genuinely had so much fun with this group of students," Mrs. Arnold said. "They are so full of passion and enthusiasm, and this experience has



been a really spectacular reminder of why I went into teaching in the first place."

Throughout the fall, students have been responsible for keeping a journal of their experiences and ideas, a portfolio of their work, and are working on a standards-based lesson that they will teach to the class.

With such a positive turnout, Mrs. Arnold will be offering the follow-up course EDU 150: Presentation and Professional Skills in Education in the spring of 2024. Next year, students will be able to start their career exploration in the fall and continue straight through the spring.

## INSTRUCTIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

### Continuous Improvement: Providing Professional Development throughout the year

Teachers in grades K-8 have been focusing on professional development for English Language Arts this year, with many teachers participating in LETRS Volume 2 professional development, ongoing training as we utilize new ELA core resources in grades K-8 and Houghton Mifflin Harcourt (HMH) site visits to provide coaching and support. By understanding the "why" behind the science of reading and evidence-based research, our teachers can better know how students learn to read and can better support students in learning to read and reading to learn.

### **LETRS (Language Essential to Teaching Reading and Spelling)**

Last year, approximately 120 elementary staff members participated in LETRS Volume 1 training. This year, our staff is participating in LETRS Volume 2 training. About 60 staff members took the training this summer and another 60 are taking it during the school year. LETRS is a comprehensive professional development course that provides educators with the background, depth of knowledge, and tools to teach language and literacy skills to every student. The course addresses four critical outcomes for effective literacy instruction: understanding the science of reading, converting research to practice, enhancing teacher effectiveness and transforming instruction. Teachers focus on letter-sound relationships, decoding, encoding, recalling irregular words, phonological awareness and tying it all together!

### Center for the Collaborative Classroom – Being a Reader

The reading program, Being a Reader, is our new core ELA resource at Ginther school in Grades K-1. Being a Reader is the first resource of its kind to integrate foundational skills instruction, practice in reading comprehension strategies and rich key literacy experiences with explicit social skills instruction and activities that foster students' growth as responsible, caring and collaborative people. Ginther teachers have received ongoing virtual training with our CCC trainers throughout the summer and fall to continue to learn more about this wonderful new ELA resource.

### HMH - Into Reading/Into Literature

The HMH Into Reading curriculum is based on research in the essential elements of literacy. Robust assessment data give teachers the information they need to differentiate reading instruction and monitor student progress toward literacy goals. Students have online practice to reinforce foundational reading

skills and vocabulary learned during whole-group lessons. HMH visited classrooms at Brockport in October to observe student participation and provide coaching and feedback for teachers and administrators, so our students are able to get the most out of the learning tool.



# SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

### First grade students learn about democracy

Our Ginther first graders were able to vote on election day, taste testing and then placing their ballot of classic or wavy potato chips. All of the students received an "I voted today" sticker after participating. Thank you to Mrs. Fazio for setting up the voting experience. After the ballots were counted, results were read to the students on Wednesday with classic chips coming out on top!



### Citizens of the Month Recognized

Students at Barclay were recognized as Citizens of the Month for their good deeds, exemplary manners and demonstrating the three Bs during the month of October. In early November, the Citizens of the Month were



treated to ice cream and games with the principal and assistant principal. Congratulations to all of these amazing students!

### Sixth grade students build Rube **Goldberg machines**

Sixth grade students at OMS are learning about technological systems, collaboration and problem solving as they work

together to build a Rube Goldberg style machine that makes a simple task extraordinarily complex. Each student is creating a small part of a machine that will link with their classmates' creations to make a "hole-inone" by dropping a golf ball into a cup. When students finish this project, they will drop a marble into one end of the machine spanning over 20 feet long and watch as over 80 steps take place to drop a golf ball into a cup!



### **National Honor Society holds** annual Thanksgiving food drive

The National Honor Society hosted a canned food drive during November, collecting Thanksgiving themed items such as mashed potatoes, stuffing, canned corn, biscuit mix, pie shells, pie fillings, etc. All food was collected, packaged and delivered to families for Thanksgiving or donated to the District food pantry. ### **Adult Sports and Fitness**

### **Red Cross Lifeguard Certification**

This course Provides entry-level participants the knowledge and skills to prevent, recognize and respond to aquatic emergencies such as injuries, sudden illness, and breathing or cardiac emergencies. Participants must be at least 15 years old and be able to complete a timed event within 1 minute and 40 seconds by starting in the water, swimming 20 yards, surface diving to a depth of 7 to 10 feet to retrieve a 10-pound object, then return to the surface and swim 20 yards on their back to return to the starting point and exit the water without using steps or a ladder. They must also be able to swim 300 yards continuously and tread water for 2 minutes using only their legs. ### **Driver Education**

### **Safe Driving Techniques (Five-Hour Course)**

The NYS Bureau of Motor Vehicles requires five hours of classroom instruction as a prerequisite for obtaining a driver's license. Applicants affected by this regulation are those applying for a first-time driver's license; those applying for a driver's license because of a lapse of a one-year renewal grace period; and those applying for a new license as a result of revocation of a previous license. The five-hour training period must be completed prior to the applicant applying for a road test. Persons having completed a regular driving education course do NOT need this program.

The following regulations are applicable to all prospective registrants:

- Registration must be completed by mailing the registration form or in person at Oliver Middle School by noon the Tuesday immediately preceding the class. There is a seven-person minimum to hold this class. Registering on time reduces the risk of cancellation.
- Students will be admitted on a first-come, first-served basis.

- Applicants must be 16 years of age or older.
- Applicants must bring their valid learner's permit to register.
- Applicants must pay the \$40 registration fee upon registering and completely fill out the registration form.

An official completion certificate, which is valid for one year from the day of issuance, will be given upon completion of the five-hour program. This certificate must be presented when applying for a

road test. It does not qualify participants for reduced insurance rates.
